### **ENVIRONMENTAL AND SOCIAL COMMITMENT PLAN**

- The Government of Kenya ("Recipient"), will implement the Kenya Horn of Africa -Groundwater for Resilience Project (P174867) (hereinafter known as "the Project") through its Ministry of Water, Sanitation and Irrigation (MoWSI) at National and County level. The International Development Association (IDA, hereinafter "the Association") has agreed to provide financing for the Project.
- 2. The Recipient will implement material measures and actions so that the Project is implemented in accordance with the Environmental and Social Standards (ESSs) of the World Bank. This Environmental and Social Commitment Plan (ESCP) sets out material measures and actions, any specific documents or plans, as well as the timing for each of these.
- 3. The Recipient will also comply with the provisions of any other E&S documents required under the ESF and referred to in this ESCP, including:
  - Stakeholder Engagement Plan (SEP), Environmental and Social Management Framework (ESMF), Resettlement Policy Framework (RPF), which have been prepared for the Kenya Groundwater for Resilience Project; and
  - b. Labor Management Procedures (LMP), Project wide Security Management Plan (SMP) and County Security Risk Assessments and Security Management Plans, and Sexual Exploitation, Abuse and Harassment (SEAH) Prevention and Response Plan as well as site specific plans and studies, including site or issue specific plans, procedures, guidelines OSH Plan and Environmental and Social Management Plans (ESMPs), which will be prepared for subprojects of the Kenya Groundwater for Resilience Project and any other plans and studies, and the timelines specified in all of those E&S documents.
- 4. The Recipient is responsible for compliance with all requirements of the ESCP even when implementation of specific measures and actions is conducted by the Ministry.
- 5. Implementation of the material measures and actions set out in this ESCP will be monitored and reported to the Association by the Recipient as required by the ESCP and the conditions of the legal agreement, and the Association will monitor and assess progress and completion of the material measures and actions throughout implementation of the Project.
- 6. As agreed by the Association and the Recipient, this ESCP may be revised from time to time during Project implementation, to reflect adaptive management of Project changes and unforeseen circumstances or in response to assessment of Project performance conducted under the ESCP itself. In such circumstances, the Recipient through the minister responsible for MoWSI will agree to the changes with the Association and will update the ESCP to reflect such changes. Agreement on changes to the ESCP will be documented through the exchange of letters signed between the Association and the Recipient through the minister responsible for MoWSI. The MoWSI will promptly disclose the updated ESCP on its publicly accessible website.
- 7. Where Project changes, unforeseen circumstances, or Project performance result in changes to the risks and impacts during Project implementation, the Recipient shall provide additional funds, if needed, to implement actions and measures to address such risks and impacts, which may include environmental, health and safety impacts, labor influx, security risks to community, Project personnel and assets, land acquisition and resettlement impacts, social impacts, and sexual exploitation, abuse and harassment (SEAH).

### 4.3 **SECURITY PERSONNEL**

Prepare, adopt and implement a county wide Security Risk Assessment and Management Plan consistent with the requirements of ESS4, in a manner acceptable to the Association and include security measures in site specific ESMPs.

The following measures shall be adopted, to ensure that the engagement of military and security personnel for provision of security to Project workers, sites and/or assets, is carried out in accordance with the ESSs:

- a) Assess the risks and impacts of engagement of the military and security personnel as part of the assessment referred to in action 1.3 c) above, and implement measures to manage such risks and impacts, a Security Management Plan, guided by ESS4, the principles of proportionality and Good international Industry practice (GIIP), and by applicable law, in relation to hiring, rules of conduct, training, equipping, and monitoring of such security personnel.
- b) Adopt and enforce standards, protocols and codes of conduct for the selection and use of military and security personnel, and screen such personnel to verify that they have not engaged in past unlawful or abusive behavior, including sexual exploitation and abuse (SEA), sexual harassment (SH) or excessive use of force.
- c) Ensure that PIU signs a memorandum of understanding (MoU), with the Ministry of Security and the NISA setting out the arrangements for the engagement of the military and security personnel under the Project, including compliance with the relevant requirements of this ESCP.
- d) Ensure that such personnel are adequately instructed and trained, prior to deployment and on a regular basis, on the use of force and appropriate conduct (including in relation to civilian-military engagement, SEA and SH, and other relevant areas), as set out in the Project Operational Manual, SMP, Security Management Plan and LMP.
- e) Ensure that the stakeholder engagement activities under the Stakeholder Engagement Plan (SEP) include a communication strategy on the involvement of military and security personnel under the Project.
